Lewiston Library **Time** Line

1901: On New Year's Day, the Men's Club of Lewiston held a "Grand Social Festival and Library Reception" at the Opera Hall for the purposes of starting a library. Each person who attended was asked to donate a book, and some people contributed up to 100 books. Vice President Theodore

Roosevelt was invited but unable to attend and sent an autographed on Oliver Cromwell.

display in the Local History Room.) Subsequently, the "Lewiston Men's Club Library" opened on Memorial Day, in the Benjamin Cornell Building at 469 Center Street with more than 2,000 volumes.

1908: The library moved to 535 Center Street and occupied the Hotchkiss building, which today is DiCamillo's Bakery.

1938: The library was almost forced to close its doors for lack of financial support. However, the Lewiston Service Guild stepped in and took over the annual



535 Center Street, where DiCamillo's is located today. The original latch doors of the "Hotchkiss" building are still there and used today.

membership drive, netting \$150, which saved the library. The Guild also made building repairs, cleaned and painted the facility and purchased new books. The Guild continued to collect door-to-door for operating funds for many decades.

1961: The Library moved into the Long House at the corner of 5th and Center Streets. The house was built by



Judge William Hotchkiss in 1815 on his return home after Lewiston was destroyed in the War of 1812.

1990: The Library moved into its new home at 305 South 8th Street.



Today's modern library on South 8th Street is a 21st Century resource center serving hundreds of people a day. Do you have your library card?

Many Locals Remember "Noel" the Library Cat from the 1970s

She appeared during a winter storm one December night back in 1970. Mrs. Scipione, Lewiston librarian, didn't have the heart to leave her out in the cold and she welcomed her inside. Noel decided that, even as the storm lifted, the library was the perfect home. (A local youngster recognized her and the owners were contacted, but Noel refused to be reunited with her family.) Although Noel spent most of her day strolling through the old stacks of books, her favorite moments were when

the children came into the library. Young students looked forward to getting their homework done with Noel - she would always find a comfortable spot on the tables. By spring time it became apparent that Noel was going to have kittens. On March 11, 1971, the checkout area of the Lewiston Library was transformed into a maternity ward. The staff stayed after hours to assist Noel as she gave birth to four healthy little kittens. All of the kittens found homes and Noel continued as the official "Library Cat" of the Lewiston Library, becoming the famous subject of local newspaper articles.
