Lewiston Hosts 200th Anniversary of First Major Battle of War of 1812 Battle of Queenston Heights Reenactment Set for Oct. 12-14, 2012

This October, "the nation's eyes will be upon us." Lewiston volunteers are working diligently with their colleagues in Canada to commemorate the first major battle of the War of 1812, called the Battle of Queenston Heights. Thousands of American troops were sent to Lewiston in October 1812 to invade Canada in an attempt to drive the British out of North America. Some call it the "Second American Revolution" because it was the second time the U.S. and Britain fought.

Why is the War of 1812 Important?

- 1) Britain stopped bullying the U.S. and allowed American ships free passage on the high seas.
- 2) The U.S. became a "real" country and not just an experiment in democracy.
- 3) It prompted the formation of today's modern day Navy.
- 4) It opened the West to expansion and "Manifest Destiny."
- 5) It began the "Era of Good Feelings" and drove economic growth throughout the 19th Century.
- 6) It gave us the words to our National Anthem.
- 7) It set the stage for 200 years of peace between the U.S. and Canada, the strongest alliance in the world.



was still a British colony at the time, and the British were responsible for defending it. The American troops outnumbered the British 4-to-1. At first, the invasion looked successful and the Americans planted the 15-star, 15-stripe, flag atop the Queenston, Ontario, escarpment in Canada. Cannons were used and troops fired their muskets at each other.

After a few hours, the British and their Native allies counterattacked. The Americans would need additional troops to cross the Niagara River to help hold the British back.

There were about 2500 American militia troops stationed in Lewiston to help the regular army troops. The militia was composed of average citizens — people like farmers, craftsmen, tradesman — who signed up to be temporary soldiers if needed during wartime.

American General Stephen Van Rensselaer ordered the militia to get in the boats to cross the river to help the American army. However, the men in the militia could see that the American army was beginning to lose the battle and refused the General's orders. The Americans were pinned down and were forced to surrender. Over 1000 Americans were taken prisoner.

To commemorate the event, hundreds of reenactors from across the U.S. and Canada will be coming to Lewiston and Queenston to participate.

Event Programs You Don't Want to Miss

Among the highlights of the event include:

Oct. 12, 4pm: "Off to War" parade and cannon procession from Academy Park to 4th Street.



Oct. 12, 7pm: Nighttime cannon bombardment of Canada from Water Street. Includes fireworks, music and Air Force fly-over.

Oct. 13, 3pm: Cannon bombardment of Canada from Artpark, during the Battle reenactment in Queenston.

Oct. 13, 9am-5pm: Interpretive programs and entertainment at Academy Park.


